The Sephardi encounter with modernity shows a counterexample to the Ashkenazi and European experience of secularization. The Mizrahi encounter with modernity offers a case study for thinking of secularization in Israel and beyond. This workshop explores the religious and secular aspects of what we view as *Mizrahi renaissance* in the context of intra-Jewish power struggles and political debates in Israel. A special focus will be given to the category *Masortiut* or Traditionism as reaction and alternative to the western religious-secular dichotomy.

This project is part of **ReCentGlobe** and **Multiple Secularities beyond the West, beyond Modernities** at the University of Leipzig. Multiple Secularities explores different forms of secularity in non-western regions. The Israeli case - unknown or overlooked - can highlight Mizrahi secularization experiences as key to the questions posed around global secularization beyond the West.
